Yolanda Ogbolu, Ph.D., NNP, FNAP, FAAN, is the Bill and Joanne Conway Dean and a Professor at the University of Maryland School of Nursing. She co-directs the Center for Health Equity and Outcomes Research as well as the Global Learning to Advance HealthEquity Network. Throughout her 14-year tenure at UMSON, she has served as Department Chair and Director of Global Health. Dr. Ogbolu's interprofessional and community- engaged research focuses on advancing health equity and enhancing nursing capacity both locally and globally. Her projects aim to strengthen nurses' ability to impact global health, improve the provision of culturally and linguistically appropriate care in both rural and urban hospitals, and address issues such as social isolation, social determinants of health, and cardiovascular and mental health challenges in marginalized communities, particularly in her native West Baltimore. Funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJ), she translated Dara Institute's social inclusion program from Brazil to Baltimore to help reduce family social isolation in West Baltimore. Dr. Ogbolu is well-regarded for her collaborative spirit and her ability to foster partnerships. These include her work with the social determinants of health task force in Baltimore and the Global Learning for Health Equity Network, collaborating with partners from institutions such as the Albert Einstein School of Medicine, Athens-City County Health, Brigham and Women's Hospital/Harvard, Corner Health, Johns Hopkins University, University of Maryland Baltimore, and the University of Maryland College Park. Additionally, she leads the West Baltimore RICH project, which connects 14 local organizations, including Coppin University School of Nursing, to address health inequities. Dr. Ogbolu has participated in initiatives at both national and international levels with organizations such as the American Association of Nursing, the National Quality Forum, the National League of Nursing, the Surgeon General's Office, and the World Health Organization. She is an elected fellow of the National Academies of Practice and a fellow of the American Academy of Nursing.
